The USPTO formally rescinded the February 2024 Biden-era guidance that allowed AI systems to perform acts that, if performed by a human, could constitute inventorship, consistent with decisions such as *Thaler v. Vidal*. The February 2024 guidance provided that “a natural person must have significantly contributed to each claim in a patent application or patent,” requiring careful scrutiny of prompts presented to the AI system to determine whether the natural person made significant contributions.

Back From The Dead(line) - “Due Care” and Patent Reinstatement Around the World

During the lifetime of a patent or patent application various deadlines are encountered and in many instances missing such deadlines, even unintentionally, may result in abandonment of the patent/application. A number of jurisdictions provide avenues for the reinstatement of patents or applications that passed to abandonment if it can be demonstrated that the abandonment occurred despite the exercise of “due care”. However, the requirements to successfully meet this standard vary and are contingent on actions taken by all involved parties prior to the date of abandonment. As such, retroactive corrective measures are often unavailable. This panel will discuss the “due care” requirements under Canadian, U.S., and European practices and provide valuable insight to mitigate against inadvertent loss of patent rights.

Current State of the Failure to Function Doctrine

This panel examines the rapid evolution of the “failure-to-function” doctrine in trademark prosecution and litigation, focusing on how recent decisions are reshaping what can (and cannot) serve as a trademark. Using the Federal Circuit’s 2025 decision in *In re Brunetti* and the district court rulings in *Penn State v. Vintage Brand* as anchors, the program would walk through recent precedents involving slogans, social messages, and Internet memes (including *In re Lizzo LLC* and other commonplace-phrase cases), as well as litigated disputes where defendants have asserted failure-to-function as a defense to infringement cases (including *Vintage Brand* as well as other recent decisions like *Top Brand v. Cozy Comfort*). The session would emphasize practical takeaways for brand owners and in-house counsel: how examining attorneys are using marketplace evidence to support refusals; how failure-to-function interacts with related doctrines like ornamentation and genericness; and what prosecution, clearance, and enforcement strategies can mitigate risk and build a record to either avoid or overcome these refusals in a post-*Brunetti* landscape.

CLOSING PLENARY

Beyond the Black Box

When the Copyright Office concluded that prompts are instructions rather than expression, the reasoning rested on a specific technological premise: AI models are unpredictable black boxes, and users can't control what comes out. That was a defensible position in 2023. The technology has moved past it. In this closing plenary, DEG.AI Chair Ian Fried, Michelle Slavich of Promise Advanced Imagination, and Tammy Zhu of Runway won't just argue the point, they'll demonstrate specific ways artists are using GenAI, hybrid production, and models like Runway to solve creative challenges and accelerate production through demos and side-by-side comparisons of detailed prompts against their outputs. This session reveals what happens when you put these tools to work on real projects. The through-line is a question the Copyright Office's own framework raises but doesn't answer: a photographer doesn't control every photon, and we've never held that against them. A skilled creator using today's AI tools controls composition, movement, style, pacing, mood, camera angle and so much more. The model executes the vision, the way a camera shutter does. The creative choices are perceptible in the outputs. It's time for a reevaluation.

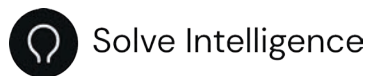
